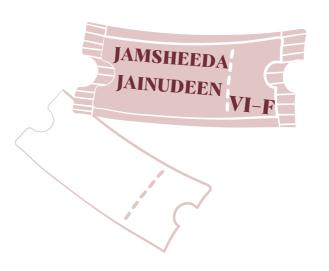

New movie theaters appeared nationwide, equipped with better seating & major Hollywood studios emerged during this era.

Then came the Golden age, during which color movies started to release and films like "The Wizard of Oz" took full advantage of advancements in special effects and the ability to shoot in color to make movies feel like magic. More genres were introduced during this period. Many stars left Hollywood to serve the armed forces in World War II. After this era came the great evolution of spread in Television.

Next is the marvel era, which is the modern cinema we are seeing now. Cinema, which started with a bang and rapidly developed with technology. Let's appreciate the development.



UNBOXING DISNEY

Do you whistle as you work? Maybe you'd rather "just keep swimming". Maybe you're attempting to squeeze your incredible cosmic abilities into a little dwelling area. If any of these lines are currently working their way out of your head, you are most likely a child of Disney, raised on a steady diet of chirpy tales to keep you amused throughout your golden childhood days.

We start our unboxing as we remove the tape by discussing the history of the evolving animation styles of Disney. Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, what a start to our trip down memory lane. When Walt decided to produce his first feature-length animated picture, he realized he would need to improve his technology for the artists to complete it. Though the animators preferred hand painting sceneries and people from their imaginations and utilizing their own mirrors for face reference, Disney decided to use rotoscoping. It is a method that involves drawing or tracing over a live action shot to make it appear more lifelike. Walt brought in reference models like Marge Champion to play Snow White, videotaped it, and the animators utilized it to make the film more fluid. Snow White was also the first film to employ a multiplane camera to give the animation depth.

Though Snow White was a huge success, and the animation was marvelous, Disney wanted to keep pushing the limits to see what more they could achieve. Instead of merely having 2D sources to follow, they built 3D models of the characters and parts of the set elements for Pinocchio. Whether you like it or not, Disney has been a driving force in technological developments, cultural effects, and animation throughout the world.

As we take out the contents from our box, we also see the lasting impact of stereotypes in Disney. Some analysts categorize the corporation's representation of women into eras. The domestic era began with female characters such as Snow White, Sleeping Beauty, and Cinderella being presented as housewives, typically cleaning and in need of a man's rescue. Orson Welles once said,

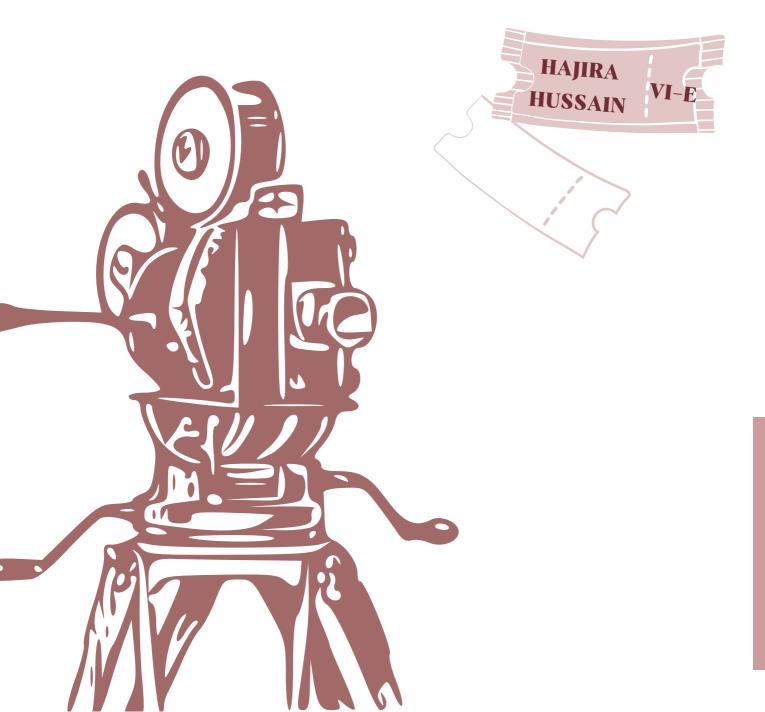

Take a look at some statistics vis-à-vis Bollywood movies in 2022: out of the 47 major films released last year, there were 6 'blockbusters', 2 'hits' and 39 'flops.' To add salt to the wound? 4 out of the 6 blockbusters- Drishyam 2, KGF 2, Kantara and RRR- were either adaptations or translations of South-Indian movies. The Hindi box office, once a pillar of grandeur, has only managed to recover 60% of its pre-pandemic levels, proving to be a mere shadow of its former glory. 2022 has cemented itself as the annus horribilis for Bollywood. With the exception of Pathaan, 2023 shows little signs of defying these developments. But who is the patient zero of the disease that has affected Hindi cinema? What is the Sanjeevani Booti, the healing remedy, to revive its fortunes? Let's explore the intricacies within. Agand action!

THE CAUSES

1. The unprecedented rise of OTT platforms

If there has been one winner from the pandemic, it's been OTT platforms like Netflix and Amazon Prime. These platforms are not just more convenient, but also suitable for discovering new content. The pandemic opened the gate for North Indian and international viewers to enter the realm of South Indian cinema. Take RRR for example, Netflix struck gold.

by including RRR in its streaming service, the film shot to the number one spot in over 60 countries upon release. Its chartbuster song 'Naatu Naatu' became an inescapable viral sensation. The international attention eventually caught the eye of the Academy Award voters, and the rest they say, was history. 3. Nepotism

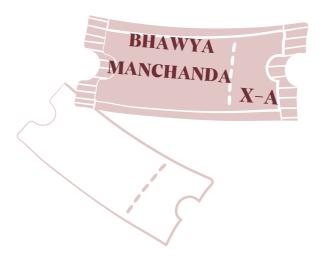

One such instance as quoted by the Royal Institution was the movie, "A Trip to the Moon" which was released in 1902. CHARLIE

Movies have been a part of our lives since we were born. Sure, there are cartoons, TV shows, and series but there's nothing better than a good movie in a theater with some popcorn or even a nice family movie in our house with our family. Watching a movie while lying on the couch is the best experience when you're tired. Movies nowadays are packed with songs dialogues and dances. But have you ever thought about how our ancestors watched movies? They used to watch silent movies.

A silent film is a film in black and white with no audible dialogues. Emotions and actions are expressed visually, sometimes accompanied with a live music track. Key dialogues are shown in title cards with a person even reading out the dialogues. There are many silent movie actors, but Charlie Chaplin or Charlie Spencer Chaplin Jr. is one of the most iconic actors of the silent movie era. He was born on 16 th April 1889 to Hannah Chaplin and Charles Chaplin Sr. At the time of his birth, Chaplin's parents were both music hall entertainers. Chaplin's childhood was fraught with poverty and hardship. His mother used to get sick very often, which forced Chaplin to work at workhouses and go to schools for paupers and destitute children. There was nothing we could do but accept the poor mother's fate, Chaplin later wrote, and she was in his care until her death in 1928.

Between these hardships, Chaplin began to perform on stage. By age 13, he had abandoned education. He supported himself with a range of jobs while nursing his ambition to become an actor. At 14, he registered with a theatrical agency in London's West End. Chaplin was promptly given his first role as a newsboy in Harry Arthur Saintsbury's "Jim: A Romance of Cockayne". In the show, Chaplin's comic performance was praised by many. Next, he played 'Billy the Pageboy' in Charles Frohman's production of Sherlock Holmes. He was called to London to play the role alongside William Gillette, the original Holmes and he went on many nationwide tours of Sherlock Holmes. In May 1906, Chaplin joined the juvenile act Casey's Circus. By the time the act finished touring in July 1907, the 18-year-old had become an accomplished comedic performer.

He struggled to find more work and soon, got a contract with Fred Karno's prestigious comedy company. Chaplin began by playing minor roles, eventually starring in lead roles. In April 1910, he was given the lead in a new sketch, Jimmy the Fearless. It was a big success, and Chaplin received considerable press attention. Karno selected his new star to join a tour along North America's vaudeville circuit. Six months into the second American tour, Chaplin was invited to join the New York Motion Picture Company. His first film, Making A Living was released on 2nd February 1914. He acted in several other movies like Mabel's Strange Predicament, Caught in the Rain.

Soon, the Essanay Film Manufacturing Company of Chicago sent Chaplin an offer of \$1,250 a week with a signing bonus of \$10,000. He joined the studio in late December 1914, where he formed a stock company of regular players, actors he worked with again and again. Several movies were released like A Night Out, The Champion, The Tramp etc.

When the Essanay contract ended in December 1915, Chaplin requested a much higher signing bonus from his next studio, which was given by Mutual Film Corporation. A contract was negotiated with Mutual that amounted to \$670,000 a year, which made Chaplin – at 26 years old – one of the highest paid people in the world. He formed his stock company in Mutual and produced a series of elaborate two-reelers: The Floorwalker, The Fireman, The Vagabond, One A.M., The Count, The Pawnshop, Behind the Screen and The Rink. The Mutual contract stipulated that he release two-reel film every four weeks, which he had managed to achieve. He made only four more films for Mutual over the first ten months of 1917: Easy Street, The Cure, The Immigrant, and The Adventurer. With their careful construction, these films are considered by Chaplin scholars to be among his finest works.

On 6th July 1925, Chaplin became the first movie star to be featured on a TIME magazine cover. He then released The Circus. At the 1st Academy Awards, Chaplin was given a special trophy. For versatility and genius in acting, writing, directing and producing The Circus City Lights, his next film, was released at a time sound films were introduced, and silent films were an anachronism. After taking a break from filming for 16 months, he released his new films Modern Times and The Great Dictator. He released and produced a lot more movies in which he was praised for his incredible skill. All too soon, in the early morning of Christmas Day 1977, Chaplin died at home after suffering a stroke in his sleep. He was 88 years old then and his funeral on 27th December was small and private. To this day, he is well known as the famous, silent film, comedic actor the world loved and for me, he will always be in my mind.

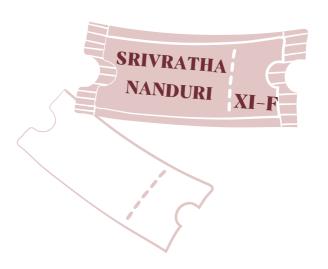

Hindi commercial cinema also started to prosper, for example Guru Dutt's Pyaasa and Phool and Raj Kapoor's Awaara and Shree 420. These movies explored social issues, mainly those related to urban working-class living in India. Mehboob Khan's Mother India, produced during that time, was the most expensive Hindi film and earned the highest revenue. More than ever, Indian movies were produced in a variety of languages. Outstanding filmmakers like Raj Kapoor, Bimal Roy, Shantaram, Satyajit Ray, K. Asif, Mehboob Khan, Ritwik Ghatak, and others emerged during this time.

Due to its instantaneous entertainment value, "masala" films became popular in the 1970s and 1980s. The patrons for these movies were Amitabh Bachchan, Jeetendra, Vinod Khanna, Rajesh Khanna, Dev Anand, and many more. Horror, mystery, comedy, action, thriller, and romance films were popular at this time. The actors and actresses enjoyed fame like never before after becoming celebrities and superstars. Popular Hindi films are characterized by significant changes that are too numerous to explain in detail.

The song-and-dance routine has become more systematized and predictable in its patterns, the other, whether it takes the form of a terrorist or an unstoppable villain, has a darker presence, the nation is more fixed in its demands that we submit to it and bow to it. Indian movies have trimmed and tightened their screenplays from their previous 3 hours of drama in order to capture the attention of spectators who have trouble focusing.

You would notice a significant difference in the technical aspects of filmmaking if you viewed Hollywood and Bollywood films back-to-back. In Hollywood, there is a huge strive for perfection. Movies have budgets in the millions, and it shows. Things are a little different in Bollywood. The maximum budget for a movie is 500 million rupees, or around \$7 million. Compared to the typical Hollywood budget of \$35 million, that is a significant reduction. The final production is clearly affected by the significant budgetary disparity. Bollywood needs to get more production value out of less.

Now that the main differences have been picked and talked about, how have the industries influenced and shaped each other? Hollywood has learned quite a few lessons from Bollywood and vice versa. Catchy music in the form of song-and-dance epic numbers has started to gain popularity in Hollywood. Chicago's "Razzle Dazzle", Mamma Mia', "Dancing Queen" and Enchanter's "That's How You Know", line. Like musical numbers prevalent in many Bollywood scenes, the setting is captured with a wide-angle lens to immerse the spectator more closely in the dancing itself. It has come to represent the new generation of Hollywood musicals. We see that both film industries have worn quite a bit of each other. The fight scenes in action movies, love triangles in the romance genre, convenient coincidences, and of course, the melodramatic scenes, all have improved and enhanced by each other's influence.

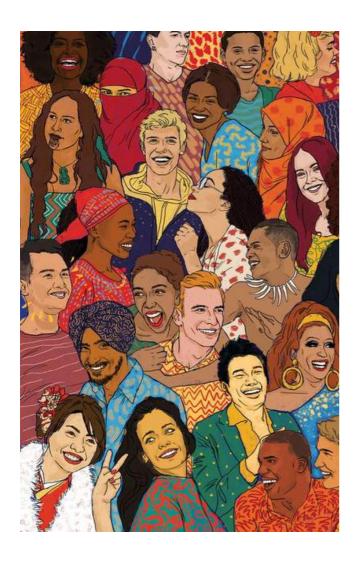

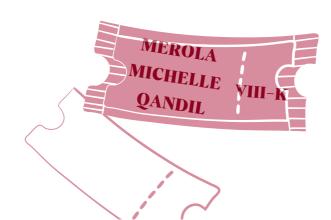

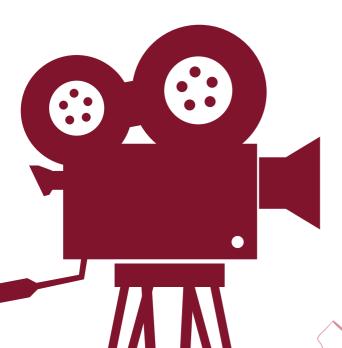


हिंदी सिनेमा का विकास: समय की एक यात्रा

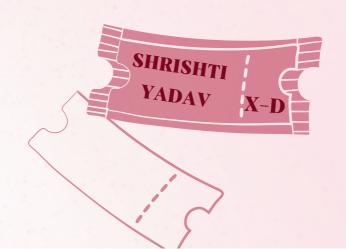

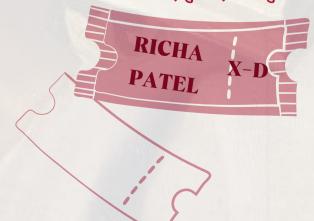

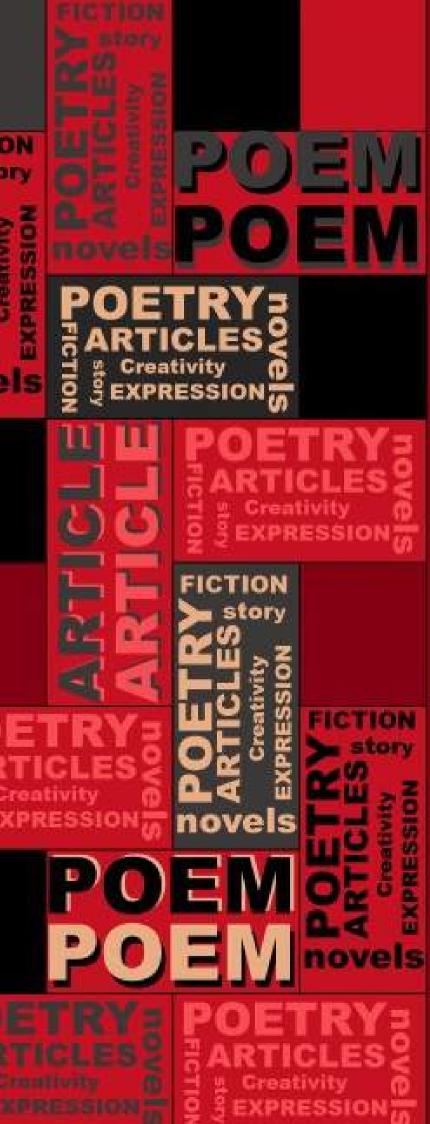
